OUR SCHOOL


Founded in 1957, CWA is an independent coed college preparatory day school for students in Preschool through Grade 12. CWA is located in a suburban setting at the foot of Mt. Rainier and draws students from a 50-mile radius.

NOTEWORTHY COURSES

American Voices + American Writers and Research These courses will serve as an introduction to thinking about the canon of American literature, as well as contemporary American writers. Students will examine the ways of reading, analyzing, and classifying a wide range of forms of literature across a rich selection of themes, including race and class, gender and sexuality, national or regional heritage, and historical context. A central focus will be an independent research project known as the Academic Research for College Project (ARC), which includes a series of readings and presentations about the life and work of each student's selected author. Through class instruction and the development of this project, this course extends the analytical reading and writing skills taught in the first two years of the Upper School, while moving to subtler concerns of precise diction, usage, sentence variety, style and voice. This course is a graduation Requirement.

Science Research Open to exceptional science students who have completed biology, chemistry, and physics, this intensive, advanced science course provides students the opportunity to pursue a yearlong independent research project on a topic of their choosing. Utilizing state-of-theart tools and technology in CWA's Weyerhaeuser Research Lab, students propose, design, test, and present projects under the direction of the teacher and/or a project advisor. The course emphasizes technical writing, research methods, statistical analysis, peer review, and public presentation. Each project culminates in a written paper, supported by an evening presentation in late spring.

Humanities Capstone Students in this class will propose, design, and execute a humanities project of their own making over two trimesters. The final project is expected to be academically rigorous but is open to a broad range of options. Project types could include academic research papers, public history, social or political engagement, and/ or professional development linked to senior internships. In the first trimester the students will focus on developing the research and writing skills necessary to develop and present a successful project in their field of study and will culminate in the presentation of their proposed project. In the final trimester, the students will execute and present the results of their project. This course requires the ability to work independently and the willingness to collaboratively develop a project of your own design. Humanities Capstone in English meets the Senior English requirement.
